## Lesson Fifteen: Giving

We are nearing the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> G. This last G stands for Go. In the last lesson we talked about how God has gifted each of us and commanded us to serve one another and those who are outside of the faith. In this lesson, we are going to explore the topic of money and how we can use it to invest in things that matter for eternity.

### It's A Team Effort

What is your favorite sport? \_\_\_\_\_ Basketball has always been my favorite sport. Basketball is all about the team. We often think of the great players. Players like Magic Johnson, LeBron James, Larry Bird, and Kobe Bryant. But without a team playing with them they are nothing.

Consider Michael Jordan. He is the greatest to ever play the game ever, but he didn't start winning championships until the Chicago Bulls started assembling a competent team around him. And Michael had to learn to trust and utilize his teammates to accomplish the goal of winning a title.

And in much the same way, you and I have been called to partner together to accomplish the mission that God has given to us. No, we aren't called to win a sporting championship, but to reach the world with the gospel of Jesus. And we can't do that alone. So how can we reach the world?

### Crazy Generous

We reach the world through our generous giving. In 2 Corinthians 8, Paul uses a poor church in Macedonia to teach us a powerful lesson on giving. Let's start with verses 1 and 2, "We want you to know, brothers, about the grace of God that has been given among the churches of Macedonia, for in a severe test of affliction, their abundance of joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part."

Paul begins this chapter by using the Christians in Macedonia as an example of generous giving. But what kind of church was this that was so generous? Complete these phrases from verse 2. "...in a severe test \_\_\_\_\_  
\_\_\_\_\_..." "...and their extreme \_\_\_\_\_..."

These Christians were the poorest of the poor and yet they gave very generously. We make all kinds of excuses for why we can't or shouldn't give, but the Macedonian believers didn't do that. They were going through all of this stuff, and yet they were very generous!

He describes their generosity in 2 Corinthians 8:3, "For they gave according to their means, as I can testify, and beyond their means, of their own accord," They gave, and they gave sacrificially. They gave beyond what was logical. Beyond what made sense to other people. Some people aren't going to understand your generosity and that's ok. Don't let that deter you from giving in such a way that pleases God and helps others.

### Join Hands

These people were so poor that they had to beg Paul to take their gift. Notice what Paul says in 2 Corinthians 8:4, “begging us earnestly for the favor of taking part in the relief of the saints—”

They were so insistent because they wanted to partner together with Paul to reach more people with the gospel of Jesus. That’s what the phrase, “taking part in the relief of the saints” means. It is a partnering together.

I like to use the illustration of joining hands. Imagine two people that are twenty feet apart. How can we connect them without either one moving from where they are? What we need are people who can come alongside and join hands until the two are connected. They have to partner together to accomplish the mission. And that is exactly what we do when we give.

We partner together to reach people right in our own community. When you give and people trust Jesus here, you have a part in that. We partner together to reach people all around the world by giving to missions. We join hands with men and women all over the globe to reach those who are outside of the faith. And every time that someone trusts Jesus in any of these places, you have a part in that when you give.

Invest!

But how could these poor Christians in Macedonia be so giving? That is a great question and one that Paul answers in 2 Corinthians 8:5, “and this, not as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then by the will of God to us.”

What did they give first? \_\_\_\_\_

And that is the secret to their generosity, they gave themselves to God first. Have you ever given your life to God? \_\_\_\_\_ I’m not talking about trusting Jesus as your Savior. I’m talking about surrendering your life completely to Him. A full surrender that says, “Lord, wherever you want me to go, I will go. Whatever you want me to do, I will do. Whatever you want me to give, I will give.”

When we give ourselves to God fully, it’s not really a big deal for us to give Him our money, our talents and abilities, our time, and everything else. But how can we know if we have really given ourselves to God? Jesus gave us a test to figure it out. The same phrase is used in two separate accounts of Jesus’ life. Luke 12:34 says, “For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.” Matthew 6 says exactly the same thing, “For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.”

The first thing that I want you to notice about these verses is what they do not say. They do not say that where your heart is there your treasure will be also. It says where your treasure is there will your heart be also. In other words, we can look at where we spend our money, and it will show us where are hearts really are.

For instance, if I invest heavily in Apple stock, my heart is going to be with Apple. I will want to see them succeed so that I can make money! Our wallet shows where our hearts are located. I could sit down with you, and have you pull up your bank records online and based upon that I could tell what the most important things in your life are. And you could do the same with me.

If money can show us where are hearts really are, that also means that I can use my money to change my heart. Let’s go back to the Apple stocks. Let’s say that we sell off all of our Apple stocks and decide to invest them in Microsoft. Which company are we going to hope does well? \_\_\_\_\_ Why? \_\_\_\_\_

Because that’s the company that I am invested in. Many times, our hearts aren’t close to God because I’m not invested in God. Many times, we feel distant from the church because we aren’t invested in the church. If you want that to change, Jesus has given us the formula to change that. Start investing today!

## Grow In Generosity

Some of us are invested, but Jesus wants us to grow in our generosity. Now Paul wants the Corinthians to apply the example of the Macedonians. Look at 2 Corinthians 8:6-7, “Accordingly, we urged Titus that as he had started, so he should complete among you this act of grace. But as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you—see that you excel in this act of grace also.”

The word grace in verse 1 and here is in reference to their giving. They didn’t give based upon worth or merit, it was grace. Paul commends these believers for their faith, utterance, knowledge, diligence, and their love for Paul, but they hadn’t grown in the area of generosity.

All of us need to grow in generosity as well. We could all give more to God. We could all give more to reach others, both in our own community and around the world. You ought to be able to look back over this past year and say that I am a more generous person today than I was yesterday.

Here at Beachside, we have a growth path of generosity to help you grow in your giving and it looks like this: First-time giver -> Regular giver -> Tither -> Abundant giver. A First-time giver is exactly what it sounds like, it is someone who gives any amount for the very first time. This is the first step in the path of generosity. The next step is a Regular giver. A Regular giver is someone who gives something sometimes. As you grow in generosity, you move from a Regular giver to a Tither. That word tithe simply means ten percent. A Tither gives ten percent of everything they make to God through their local church. The final step in the path of generosity is Abundant giver. This is someone who gives beyond ten percent. They just love to give and give and give to help reach others for Jesus. Which one of these steps of generosity would you say that you are on here at Beachside?

Now Paul wants to clarify something for us in 2 Corinthians 8:8, “I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine.” Notice what Paul tells them. I’m not commanding you to give, but I do want to share with you what others have done and how God has used them.

He doesn’t command them, because God isn’t in the arm-twisting business. 2 Corinthians 9:7 shows us how God wants us to give, “Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.” We are to give with purpose. And we are to give cheerfully. Not because I have to, but because I want to. You should have a desire to give.

Notice the second half of 2 Corinthians 8:8, “I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine.” Paul says that giving proves that your love is true. True love gives! And Jesus proved that!

Jesus is our example and look what He did in 2 Corinthians 8:9, “For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich.” Jesus set the example for us. He was willing to give everything for you! Including His life!

## Conclusion

What about you? Are you holding back from Him? Or are you giving Him everything that you have? The first thing that you need to give to Jesus is yourself. Jesus, I surrender my life to you!

Once we surrender our lives to Him, it’s not such a big deal to give Him our money, our time, our talents and abilities. God is a generous God, and He wants you to be generous too!
